New Horizons on the Past

History and Translation Network 2026 Online Conference

21-22 May 2026

The **History and Translation Network** (HTN) brings together researchers and practitioners from different disciplines interested in both the historical dimensions of translation and interpreting, and the role of translation and interpreting in shaping and revealing historical contexts. Since its launch, the network has held two in-person conferences — in Tallinn (2022) and Graz (2024) — as well as a first online event in May 2023.

At recent HTN network meetings, there was a clear call to create more space for early-career researchers (ECRs) to shape the field and the network's activities.

In response to this, we particularly invite contributions from early-career scholars, including doctoral researchers and those within five years of completing their PhD, which explore new directions in the study of translation and interpreting history.

The theme is deliberately broad, encouraging contributions that explore historical questions in which translation and interpreting play a central or significant role, including interdisciplinary approaches.

Additionally, the organising committee and the HTN Steering Group will invite one of the accepted presenters to give the keynote address, rather than pre-selecting a keynote speaker. This will allow us to give greater visibility to early-career researchers and acknowledge the relevance of their contributions to the field, while broadening access to it and making it more inclusive.

Structure

Main conference: the conference will be held online over two days on 21–22 May 2026, with a single stream of sessions to encourage focused discussions.

Pre-conference training day: in addition to the main conference, we will also host a **training day** on **20 May**, aimed at supporting early-career researchers. This will include:

- A roundtable with invited scholars sharing their experiences and advice on navigating academic careers, followed by a discussion session with ECRs
- A short mental health workshop for doctoral students and ECRs
- A workshop on postdoctoral funding and proposal writing

Further details about the training day will be announced in the final programme.
